

In 2020, Australians want to see ethical behaviour in our leaders above all - and this is increasing of Australians believe politicians behaving ethically is important, up from 51% in February of people believe it is the single most important quality in a political leader, followed closely by problem solving at 20% Higher income earners are more \$150K+ = 74%


